Pastor's Message

In February the Church celebrates Transfiguration Sunday (February 10th) when Jesus, calling three of His disciples to follow Him, climbed the mountain to meet with Elijah and Moses and was there “transfigured” by the glory of God. This is an important story for understanding Jesus and our place in His world.

From the mountain top one has a broader view of the world, from His mountain top Jesus had a clear view of His destiny, which was the Cross of Calvary where He would fulfill God’s plan to die for others/us. Having seen His destiny Jesus committed Himself to going that way, Scripture says, He “set His face” to go to Jerusalem (Luke 9:51). Jesus followed God’s plan even when that plan meant rejection and death. Ultimately God used His faithfulness to redeem this lost and fallen world. We too have experiences in life which God uses to grant us the gift of spiritual sight. In these experiences God enables us to more clearly see our place in His world and His direction for our lives. Sometimes we might describe these experiences as mountain top moments, other times they may best be described as the valleys of life. But in both situations God uses these experiences to grant us clarity in our spiritual vision. For example, when someone dear to us passes away, especially someone who is not expected to die, we re-examine the frailty of life and consider our own mortality. This is a moment when God speaks to us. When this happens to you, listen to His still, small voice in your heart. Harken to the direction, perhaps even new direction, that He offers you.

I will never forget sitting in Driver’s Education class in High School when the instructor said, “Statistically, one of you in this room will die of injuries sustained from a car crash.” We were brash teenagers who could not imagine dying, but regardless of our diminished capacity to imagine it, one of our classmates did die only months before graduation. He was my best friend of eleven years, and his death caused me to reconsider who I was and how I was living my life. Within a year God had turned my life in a whole new direction.

Disease, a lost job, a broken relationship, a financial crisis, the gift of a new relationship, a new job, or a new baby, these and my other experiences are the points when God grants us a new spiritual vision of our journey through time on His planet.

Has God spoken to you recently? Has He given you a new vision of your place in His Kingdom? You may grasp that reality, it is a precious gift from the Lord.

Women's Ministries

In Genesis 1 God describes the Holy Spirit as “hovering” or “brooding” over the newly created cosmos in preparation for creating order and filling the earth.

I think God's Spirit is brooding over Emmanuel these days. He is prompting some of His people to ponder or brood over the beginning of a Women's Ministry program. If you have ideas of how this ministry might take shape or are interested in participating in it please speak to Pastor Tim.

Here are some thoughts about different shapes and styles the ministry might have;

It might come together as two groups, one meeting during the day, and one during the evening. These groups might be better understood as the “Circle” groups of old, such as the Dorcas Circle or the Lydia Circle.

They could have a purpose in serving God through serving others. Service projects might include hosting funeral receptions, knitting the prayer shawls, pushing wheel chair bound folks to the twice annual Martha and Mary worship services that Emmanuel will lead, or helping to manage the kitchen area. We have ministries already in place that we could be a support to. Or could we adopt a local school and support them in various ways. Where can the Lord lead us. *Perhaps you have more ideas to share.*

They should have a devotional element where women could devote themselves to the Lord in prayer and Bible reading led by one of the members.

Fellowship is a key element to Women's Ministries, so taking time to share about what is happening in our lives and perhaps praying for one another might be part of the purpose.

A Rich History of 66 years Chapter Twelve

The women’s ministry was still active and strong during 1985. A church bazaar was held during the summer complete with “homemade handcrafts, baked goods, white elephants, sweets by the piece and coffee.” Proceeds were divided between the local church’s carpet fund and the support of young churches in the American Lutheran Church. A “Mother’s Day” celebration was held at the Sons of Norway. At this celebration great women in Lutheran history were celebrated as well as Emmanuel Lutheran’s history. It appeared that Emmanuel went through some struggles in 1985.

In 1986 Pastor Peterson described the year as a year of “stabilization and quiet rejuvenation.” Attendance increased this year and more were participating in Emmanuel’s activities.

“ We had a series of films and discussions on aging in January. The congregation decided to enter the Search Bible Study, so Vince Keller, Ed Runquist and I were sent to Portland for a weekend of training in July. We had the Willises (our member, Gladys Willis, here in August at an ice cream social to show and tell of their trip to Haiti and Christian work there. A summer Bible study on the first eleven chapters of Genesis (we are currently studying Genesis in our Wednesday evening Bible study) was also conducted.”

In the fall of this year they saw an increase in attendance at Sunday School. Thirty people attended the second unit of the Search Bible Study.

The 40th Anniversary was observed in October. Three former Pastors visited along with former members that had moved away. Soon after this occasion the new doors were donated in memory of John Hage (Dollie Hage’s husband). They are shown in the picture below. The organ chimes were given in memory of Florence Skinner. (Mysteriously, the chimes disappeared. No one seems to know what happened to them.) The ladies held another successful bazaar. The parsonage was rented out and proceeds went towards the support of a part-time youth worker. A committee was looking for a person to fill the position.

Pastor Peterson completed 305 calls during the year. (76 to member homes, 105 to patients in the hospital, 97 to the sick and shut-ins at home and 29 calls to individuals that had shown an interest in the church.)

“This has been an encouraging year. I wish to thank the membership for their faithful support this past year. With fewer members, the congregation has joined in to faithfully carry on the work of our Lord. Whether it is in the Sunday School, choir, food bank, or whatever activity, God’s work is only accomplished where there are willing and faithful workers. This is also a clue to the future of our life and program in 1987. I pray that each of us will respond to the Lord’s call to live and to work with gladness and faithfulness.”

"I Love to Tell the Story" —————The story behind it!

"Then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory."

Mark 13: 26



Arabella Katherine Hankey was the author who wrote the words to "I Love to Tell the Story." She was born in 1834 and raised in a wealthy neighborhood south of London. It was called "the Clapham Sect" that worked together to eradicate slavery. They were a group of Anglican evangelicals that also "advocated prison reform, education for children and the expansion of missionary efforts overseas." The small group changed the world.

Being raised in this environment she became involved with religious work at a very young age. She taught Sunday School and at eighteen she formed a Bible study for factory girls.

During the winter of 1865-1866, Arabella "Kate" became seriously ill. She was confined to bed for an entire year. During that time Kate wrote a poem with one-hundred stanzas entitled "The Old, Old Story." The first sections was titled, "The Story Wanted" and the second section was "The Story Told."

"The following year, at the international convention of the Young Men's Christian Association, Major General Russell, ended his powerful sermon by quoting from Kate's poem. It left the audience breathless. Songwriter, Milliam Doane, in the crowd that day, put a portion of Kate's poem to music, giving birth to the hymn "Tell Me the Old, Old Story."

Another composer, William G. Fischer, set a second portion of Kate's poem to a musical score he named "Hankey," and thus we have this hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story." It was first published in an American hymnbook in 1869, and was later popularized around the world in the great evangelistic campaigns of D.L. Moody and Ira Sankey."

News from our Childcare Center

The theme for the month of February is **Black History Month**. Week 1 the children studied African American Men. Week 2 they will study Presidents. Week 3 African American Women will be studied. Week 4 they will learn about Foods and Traditions.

The children are learning about the letter's P, Q, and R. They are talking about number's 16, 17, and 18. And of course the colors for the month are Pink and Red and the shape is the Heart.
