Emmanuel Lutheran Church, like the church at large, observes the seasons of the church year, which serve as a guide to the life of Christ and the walk of the believer. The four Sundays leading up to Christmas are the season of Advent. Advent means, "coming," and refers to the coming of Christ, the Son of God, our savior and Lord. Jesus makes His advent among us first as the Babe of Bethlehem, whose innocent appearance as a baby foreshadows His work to be the Suffering Savior of the world. He then makes His advent among us in the person of the Holy Spirit, who dwells within us. Through His presence in our lives, we have daily fellowship with God. Finally, He makes His advent among us in His second coming, as Lord and Judge of all. On that day all will stand before His throne of judgment. Those who by faith know the Savior have already passed through this judgment and will enter into eternal life. During the season of advent we follow Jesus' admonition to "prepare" and "be ready" for His coming. We do this through our tradition of seasonal preparations. At home this means our cleaning, baking and decorating. We do this in our tradition of family activities such as using the Advent Calendar and the Advent Wreath. In our home we have an Advent Calendar and use it each week with our grandchildren, who also are delighted to light the Advent candles (and blow them out). We do it in the tradition of special Scripture readings, songs and prayers. Advent is a season rich in song and prayers. We do it while we are at church, and we do it at home in our personal devotions and reflections.

The point is, Jesus is coming. Luther reminds us there is nothing we can do to hasten His coming or to delay it. He is coming according to the Father's timetable independent of anything we do or do not do. May you be ready for His Advent by your tradition of preparations. May you know the sweet

presence and joy of Jesus as He comes to you, according to His Word.

What is the Origin of "Silent Night"

We all know the words to Silent Night and for many of us it is our favorite Christmas Carol. Did you know that it originally came from Austria? It was Christmas Eve in the Austrian Alps back in 1818. Father Joseph Mohr was preparing for the midnight service. This was a frustrating evening for Father Mohr because the church organ was broken. "But Father Joseph was about to learn that our problems are God's opportunities, that the Lord causes all things to work together for good to those who love Him. It came into Father Joseph's mind to write a new song, one that could be sung organless." He quickly wrote the words to Silent Night and asked his organist, Franz Gruber to compose a simple tune. On December 24, 1818, "Silent Night" was sung for the first time as a duet accompanied by a guitar. Ironically enough, this was at the Church of St. Nicholas in Obernodorf.

"Were it not for a broken organ, there would never have been a "Silent Night."
