Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday



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The closest I ever got to the events of the Civil Rights Era was a television newscast, in fact, it wasn't until I was a college student that I ever saw a person who was black. Nevertheless, Martin Luther King Jr. is important to me. When I read the Old Testament prophets I am reminded of King's message, I think of King as a modern day prophet. His message was rejected by the people, just as the message of the prophets was rejected. He himself was rejected by the people, just as the prophets were rejected. He was martyred for his stand and his message, as were some of the prophets. His message was a message from God, just as the prophets spoke God's Word.

The prophets called the people to hear and follow the Law of God. Repentance, turning from our own ways, turning to God and His ways, was how they were to follow God's Law. King spoke God's word to a generation which believed in God and good works but rejected many of God's people simply because of their color. This was unacceptable to God and it was unacceptable to Martin Luther King Jr., God's spokesman. God called King to speak His Word, which I think synthesizes with the message of the Old Testament prophets something like this, "We are God's children, we have all be created by God in His image and likeness (Genesis chapter one). Therefore, we are all of equal value in the eyes of God, and we are all due proper respect. We are called upon by God in His Word to treat each other with respect, without regard for color of skin. When we disrespect someone because of their color (or gender, or abilities or disabilities) we also disrespect God When we respect one another we show respect for God our Creator."

I am proud and pleased that at Emmanuel God has brought together people of different colors both in our church and in our childcare center. We have the privilege of honoring God by respecting one another in a world where such respect is not always given. Our people who are black and our people who are white have all blessed one another with their gifts and faith, and we have honored the God who made us with our various beautiful colors. Well done, Saints of God.

May we, this year, hear again the message of God through His prophets of old and through His modern day prophet, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

A Rich History of 66 years Chapter Eleven

In 1984 a Caring Committee was formed. A core group was trained and the larger community was started. The Associate Pastor, Pastor Sachs resigned in June. This left the parsonage empty. The church sponsored a former member, Darla Dietsch, to do missionary work in Guatemala. A second refugee family, the Hua family, were doing custodial work. The church was sponsoring this family. They departed in 1984 to California. It was this year that the church reached a milestone. The completion of the debt payments on the sanctuary was completed. The former Pastor Stanley Gunsten attended a special service. On November 17, 1984 a Mortgage Burning Celebration banquet was held. There was a special Turkey dinner served that evening. It looked like our Richard Boyce and Adeline Stouffer (Mark's mom) had a very significant role in coordinating this event. The cost of the tickets for the dinner was \$5.00 for Adults, \$2.50 for students and children under six were free.

The church lost 8 of their members that year. These members included Charles Stouffer (Evelyn's husband), Lewis Stouffer (Mark's dad) and Steven Sutherland (Gerri's son).

A bag was handed to you in your home. Inside the bag you had a stewardship booklet and budget brochure. Also, inside the bag is an envelope bearing your name. Inside there is a "Estimate of Giving" card which you were asked to fill out. You sealed the card in the envelope and placed it in a pouch in the bag. In order to complete your part of the Run, you relayed the bag to the family that came next on the route list. You then reported to the Trail Boss that you completed your part of the Run. Kay Kannitzer's husband, Karl, served as the General Manager for this campaign.



In Loving Memory ————— *Adelaide Loyland Jensen*



Adelaide was born May 1, 1922 on a farm near Thompson, N.D. , and went home with the Lord on December 26, 2012. She graduated from High School by age 16. In 1940 she graduated from College and became a teacher. In 1944 she moved to Bremerton and taught at Dewey Jr. High School. She also worked for the postal service. She married Carl V. Jensen in 1951. She and Carl came to Emmanuel from Our Savior's in 1958. Their second son, Gregory was baptized at Emmanuel at the same time as his cousin. Both of her sons were confirmed at Emmanuel. Adelaide was very active in the community and church. She taught Sunday School, VBS and served on church council. She was active in the local PTA and was recognized with the Golden Acorn Award. She was preceded in death by her husband Carl and son Stephen. The doors that are between the narthex and the sanctuary were given in memory of her husband, Carl.

Adelaide was important part of our congregation and will surely be missed !

“Go Tell It On the Mountain” ————— *The story behind it!*

“Then the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told them” - Luke 2:20

“During the bitter days of slavery, black workers on American plantations solaced themselves with song and created a unique form of American hymnology - The Negro Spiritual.” The Jubilee Singers of Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee sang the old plantation songs from the slaves and made them famous. “Go Tell It on the Mountain” was one of the last spirituals published.

John Wesley Work Jr. was the son of a church choir director. John Work Jr. was a student that attended Fisk University and was active in the music program even though he was a history and Latin student. After graduating John returned to the university as a professor of Latin and Greek. However his greatest love was preserving the Negro Spirituals.

Even though “Go Tell It on the Mountain” had been performed by the Jubilee Singers it was still unknown. Quite often the words for Negro Spirituals were not recorded anywhere. Songs were simply passed on from plantation to plantation and generation to generation. For this spiritual the chorus was clear. “Intrigued by the chorus and melody, John wrote two new stanzas for this song. It became his custom before sunrise on Christmas morning to take students caroling from building to building, singing “Go Tell It On The Mountain.” It was first published in 1907 in Work’s “Folk Songs of the Negro as Sung on the Plantations”.



John Work has been called the first black collector of Negro folk songs.” His two sons followed in his footsteps. They also collected Negro folk songs, were on the faculty at Fisk University, and sang with the Jubilee Singers.

“To black slaves in antebellum America, the birth of a liberating Savior was a message to be heralded from the highest mountains.” It still is, for us all.
