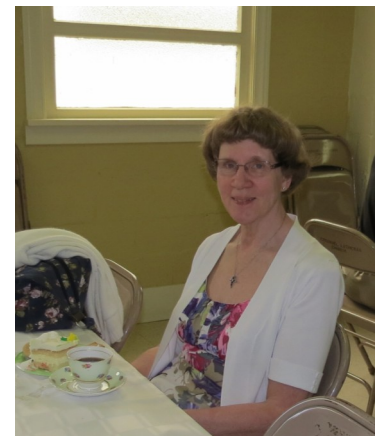

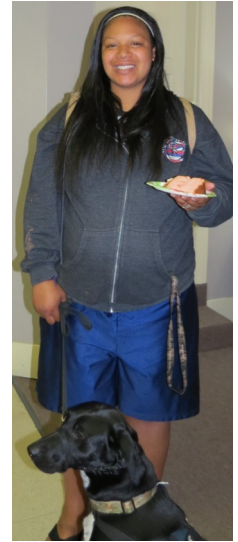

June 26, 1988 marked a milestone for both Emmanuel and Pastor Bob Peterson. Pastor Bob had served at Emmanuel for 17 years and he retired after 40 years in the ministry. "Peterson ministered to farmers in North Dakota, iron ore miners in Minnesota and state workers in Salem, Ore., before arriving in Bremerton with his wife, Evelyn. He helped build new churches in those parishes, he recalled. The most remarkable developments that have occurred during his 40 year career have been the ecumenical efforts between Protestant and Roman Catholic churches, he said." - Bremerton Sun—6/26/88

There was a simple salad pot-luck following the second service with a short program. The church presented him with a \$500 check so that he and his wife could go on a trip. 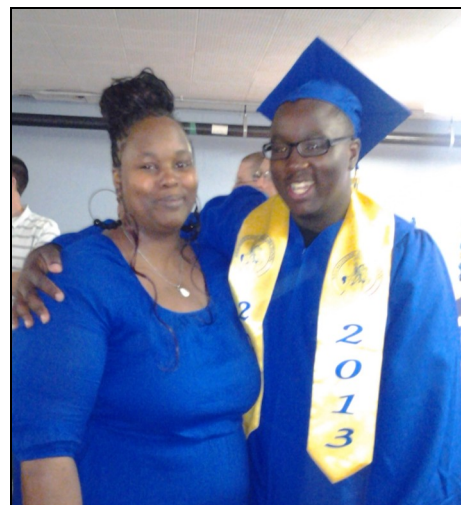

What is the story behind "God of Our Fathers" ?

"This patriotic hymn represents a double celebration of America's one hundredth birthday. The words were written in 1876 by a New England pastor in honor of the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The music was written twelve years later in celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the adoption of the United States Constitution."

The author, Daniel Crain Roberts, was a veteran of the Civil War. He served as a private with the 84th Ohio Volunteers during the war. After the war he was ordained as a deacon with the Presbyterian Episcopal church and became a priest shortly afterwards. As our country celebrated its one-hundredth birthday, he wrote the words and submitted them anonymously to the committee for the Episcopal hymnal and it was accepted. The melody was not the original one. At first Roberts set the words to the tune of the Russian National Anthem. "Twelve years later George William Warren (self-taught organist) composed the stately tune with its trumpet fanfares. " It became known as the "National Hymn", celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of our U.S. Constitution.

George Warren had no formal training, so he was pursuing a business career. He had a natural musical gift which drew him in the direction of a musical career. He became one of "America's premier organists." "When George Warren died in 1902, there was a feeling that no organist could play as well as he could, so not a single note of music was played at his funeral, which was attended by thousands."
