Pastor's Message

May 24 is Pentecost Sunday, the celebration of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' believers. You are invited to wear red, the color of the day. Acts says that "tongues of fire" came to rest on the believers, this symbolized the gift of the Spirit. Our red recalls that experience.

What is the meaning of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit? Let me share one relevant point. In the Old Covenant (or Old Testament) the people of God followed the teaching of God as it was revealed in the Law which was given to Moses on Mt. Sinai. The Law, encapsulated in the Ten Commandments, was carved into stone tablets and kept in the Arc of the Covenant, a holy box stored in the Holy of Holies room of the Tabernacle and later the Temple. God instructed the priests to regularly and publicly read this Law s God's people would know His will. They did not do a good job of obeying this rule. Consequently they did not understand God's will and did what was right in their own eyes.

Later, God spoke through the prophet, Jeremiah, saying that He would make a new covenant (or contract or testament) with His people. In this New Testament He would be their God and they would be His people and He would put His "Law in their minds and write it on their hearts...." and, "they will all know Me, from the least of them to the greatest." (Jeremiah 31:31-34).

The point is that under the Old Testament, God's Law was written on stone, that is externally from their soul. But under the New Testament God's will is written on our hearts, our souls, so we can all know the Lord and His will for us.

This is a reference to the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. He is the Spirit of Truth and He teaches us all truth (John 16:5-13). We still want to rely on God's revealed Word, the inspired, inerrant, infallible Word of God that is the Holy Scriptures. That is our external check on the internal revelation of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost reminds us not to neglect the Counselor who is within us, the Holy Spirit (John 14:17), who teaches us God's will from within.

I call upon you to take time, in this Pentecost celebration, to turn your heart quietly to God and listen to the still small voice of the Counselor who is within you and who will speak to you personally. He knows you, He loves you, and He desires to fellowship with you.

A Member's Amazing Story of Our Lord's Protection

Fifty five years ago on May 29th, a father, mother, son, two daughters and their family dog, Scamp, headed out eager to spend a Memorial Day weekend in Grand Coulee, Washington. It was an unusually mild winter and the beautiful Chinook Pass was opened early. The family decided to take this beautiful scenic route to Grand Coulee. (If you haven't driven this route I suggest you do, it is truly amazing.) That Saturday morning they packed up their station wagon and headed out early, eager to enjoy their weekend. As they approached Chinook Pass they came upon a road block. There were several cars stopped and they were among those cars. Apparently, due to warming temperatures, there were a series of avalanches. This being a sight so seldom seen by many, all of the travelers got out of their cars for a better look. What these innocent travelers didn't know was that this wasn't the only avalanche to occur that day. "The girls explained later that they had dashed for shelter behind a parked automobile when they saw the avalanche roaring down on them. The snow buried the car and the girls, but didn't knock them off their feet. 'All of a sudden we saw the snow coming down and then we were under it', Carol said. 'My head was about two feet beneath the surface, I guess, and Mary (Carol's sister) was under me. Her head came to my elbow. I could breath pretty well, but Mary couldn't. We could talk to each other, but we couldn't move our arms or legs. We couldn't budge." They were buried along with a woman and 2 teen-age boys. At that moment all the girl's parents and brother could do is helplessly stand and watch their girls and dog be buried by a wall of snow. I can't even imagine how that would feel.

"Carol's mother, Agnes, and 15 year old brother, Ronald, were with them. 'When the avalanche came down, the snow hit under the parked cars,' Carol's mother recalled later at the home of their friends in Tacoma. 'The cars flew up in the air. You could hear the metal crunching.' "

Carol's sister, Mary, (on the left) was 11 years old. They are with their 7 month old puppy, Scamp (their life-line) Carol's mom, Agnes and of course Carol R. at age 13.

Carol's dad described it in the following way, "Everybody was out looking at the slides. I heard a rumbling noise and looked up to see the snow coming down. I could see if was going to hit where my daughters were standing." He "marked the spot in his mind." He rushed over as soon as the slide seemed to have stopped. Their family dog, Scamp, immediately became the unwitting hero. When Carol's dad ran over to the spot he saw in his mind, all he could see was Scamp's little tail sticking up out of the snow just like a little buoy. Carol had been holding Scamp's leash during the slide and her dad began to dig with his bare hands in the snow splitting his nails in the process. He was able to follow that leash to where his eldest daughter, Carol, was buried. She had a pocket of air around her and was able to breathe and communicate with her sister who was buried below her. He was able to clear the snow away down to Carol's head and shoulders. At that point he could hear his other daughter, Mary, yelling. He was able to get to her also. All that were buried that day survived. Carol walked away with only a sprained ankle and twisted knee and Mary just



had some scratches and bruises. At the time, just being 13 years old, Carol didn't see it for the miracle it was. As an adult she can look back at this day and see the hand of God in all of this amazing story. This is truly a miracle showing what our Lord can do.
