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This month we commemorate Columbus Day in honor of his discovery of America. In her day, Heloise Evenson would assert that it was Leif Erickson, not Christopher Columbus who discovered America. When we, in Church, would recognize Columbus, she would always remind us that Leif Erickson did come to America nearly five-hundred years before Christopher Columbus, but they do not give him credit for discovering America because he and his people did not lay hold of the promise and opportunity of the land which they called "Wineland" or "Vinland." They did not move here, settle down here, build homes and farm the ground. They did not raise crops, animals or families here. They came and they left.

It is to Christopher Columbus that honor is given because he and those who followed him did lay hold of the opportunities and promise that the New World held.

God gives us promises too. We can name them and describe them, as Leif Erickson did of Vinland, but that does not lay hold of their life-changing power. It is as we occupy them and work them that the promises of God changes our lives.

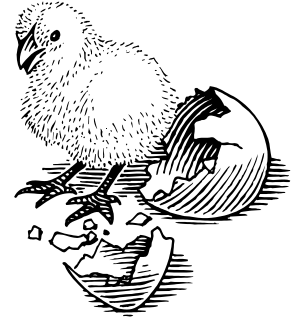

"A Mighty Fortress is Our God" is Martin Luther's most famous hymn.

He not only was a great reformer, Bible translator, political leader, fiery preacher and theologian but he was a skilled musician. He started out singing in a boys' choir for weddings and funerals and played the flute. During the reformation Luther was determined to restore worship into the service. He worked with skilled musicians and revived congregational singing. Sometimes he even borrowed popular secular melodies for his hymns.

"A Mighty Fortress is Our God" was based on the 46th Psalm. It reflects Luther's awareness of our intense struggle with Satan. When Luther was struggling with difficulty and danger he would turn to the words of this famous hymn.

Bible Study Opportunities

In our Wednesday night Genesis class we are studying creationism, evolution and intelligent design. God's Word teaches us that nature, on it's own, is incapable of designing our complex life forms or even of the so-called simple life forms. The Bible boldly declares there was a Designer for all life forms. Now even science in the discipline of micro-biology, has looked into the tiny strands of DNA and the basic building blocks of proteins that make up simple and complex life forms and discovered a new before seen complexity that the evolutionary mechanisms for change fail to explain. The only reasonable explanation of this complexity is the presence of an intelligent designer.

However, the philosophical worldview of evolution excludes all possible reference to an intelligent designer or a creator. It is limited to what nature alone can produce. Because nature cannot explain how these complex forms developed evolution is bankrupt theory that will not let go of its failed explanations. Nevertheless, our educational system refuses to acknowledge the presence of any explanation for origins that lies outside of nature.

Come and join the lively discussions of Genesis on Wednesday nights as we study our origins and the philosophical world views that compete with creationism.

A Rich History of 66 years Chapter nine

In 1980, Robert L, Peterson continued as Emmanuel’s pastor. The life of the church centered around the services of worship and holy communion. The pastor conducted 18 weddings, 12 baptisms (2 were adults), 8 confirmands (2 were adults), and 7 funerals. The church was in the process for seeking a new associate pastor.

“Within the framework of our congregational life several events of significance were held – participation in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: an adult class from Star of the Sea Catholic Church visited and dialogued with us one evening; a pulpit exchange (the Rev. Lloyd Holloway from St. Luke’s Methodist Church preached one Sunday while I preached at St. Luke’s) ; our annual church council retreat at Christa Lutheran Retreat Center in Belfair with Dr. James Moy as leader; our Temple Choir’s special presentations of the “Requiem” on Good Friday and an Advent Choral Service, and our financial canvass to secure funds for badly needed reroofing and for solving energy problems.” - Pastor Peterson

During this year Pastor Peterson experienced six weeks of silence due to voice difficulties. Wow, that has got to be frustrating for a pastor especially.

In the year, 1981, Emmanuel Lutheran celebrated their 35th anniversary. Many good things came to Emmanuel which included a new associate pastor after 20 months of searching. His name was Pastor Robert Sachs. Pastor Sachs had a very interesting article published in the Bremerton Sun in 1981, The title was “Many Problems Are Foreseen If ‘Prayer in School’ Official. Part of the article states: “While officially prescribed devotional exercises must be carefully excluded from public schools, it is important that our schools recognize the part that religion has played in the social and historical development of civilization, and provide opportunity for the study of religion in accordance with the purposes of public education. This means that freedom and responsibility of the public schools to deal with the materials of heritage in a holistic rather than truncated manner eliminates the distortion of the constitutional principle of state neutrality towards religion.

For example, to eliminate sacred or religious music from school programs would be to distort cultural heritages. To systematically exclude from the curriculum or from school programs all materials expressing religious themes would indirectly support secular humanism as the “religious” viewpoint of the public schools. However, devotional exercises to cultivate and nurture the religious faith of young people do not belong in the public schools, but in the home and the church. Officially prescribed devotional exercises open the door to sectarian intrusion or to governmental prescription of an official faith.

Therefore, parents and the churches must assume their rightful responsibility for communicating their religious commitments and values to their children. The distinctiveness of those commitments and values should be neither promoted nor undermined by the manner of religious expression in the public schools to which we pay our taxes.”

In 1981, a member of Emmanuel that had been coaching the football team at Olympic College was hired by University of Puget Sound. His name was Orson Christensen. He was the offensive backfield coach for the “Loggers” and helped them get into the playoffs.

September 27th 1981 marked the date of a first for Emmanuel Lutheran. The Pastor Robert L Peterson had the pleasure and honor of ordaining his own son, Mark Peterson. Mark Peterson was the first member of the church to enter the ministry. I am sure that many of you remember this day. I am sure it was a proud day for his dad, Pastor Robert Peterson.

In 1981 Emmanuel also celebrated their 35th anniversary. The church reached out to former pastors and invited them to attend a special service as well as a potluck dinner on October 25, 1981, As quoted from the Bremerton Sun, “Most recently, work has been completed on a \$50,000 remodeling project which included new roofing and redesign of a lower portion. Still in the planning stages are remodeling of the interior by realignment of pews and relocation of the choir from the loft to the front of the church.”



Our current member, Larry Ficca, served as the church council president that year. Through hard work and dedication, Larry and Ida’s son, Paul, received the “God and Country” award . Paul Ficca was an Eagle Scout. I am sure this was a proud moment for both Larry and Ida.

School Supplies: Pens, Pencils, and sharpeners, crayons or markers, stamps and ink pad sets, writing pads or papers, solar calculators, coloring and picture books, etc.

Hygiene Items: toothbrushes, toothpaste, mild bar soap (in a plastic bag), combs, washcloths, etc.

Other: Hard candy and lollipops (must be wrapped), **No Chocolate, mints, gum, T-shirts, socks, ball caps, sunglasses, hair clips, toy jewelry, watches, flashlights (extra batteries)**

A twenty-three year old journalist, ViKtoria Titova, from Estonia was a recipient of a shoebox 12 years ago. This changed her life and the lives of her family. She vividly remembers the "huge bag of Skittles, the little pink teddy bear, and the smell of the big bar of Dove soap." Viktoria came from a very poor family, She received tickets to an event she thought was a puppet show. It ended up being about Jesus. "The hope and excitement that shoe box delivered ignited a flame in Viktoria at the time she had shunned God. She rededicated her life to the Lord, and soon her family started forming lasting Christian relationships and realizing where true value lies. God opened the door for her to attend a Christian College in Lakeland, Florida." She began volunteering at the church and over the years as become a Christian journalist. The family from North Carolina that sent her box 12 years ago still keeps in touch with her. Twelve years after she received her shoebox she found herself interviewing Franklin Graham. The moment she opened her shoebox as an 11 year old, she realized that the God of the universe loved *her*.

2012—The year of Projects, Repair, and Renovation of God's House

What can I say ? This has been a very busy year for Emmanuel Lutheran as far as major projects and renovations go. We started off in March by replacing the old leaking metal roof on the sanctuary with a new shingled roof. Good weather blessed us and we completed the new roof in a very short time. Buckets and containers in the pews are a thing of the past, and we are now we secure in the knowledge that we will remain dry in our sanctuary when the winter rains return again soon.

Subsequent to the roof replacement, we cleaned out all of the outside drains and replaced the gutters on the both the main sanctuary and the fellowship hall buildings, to insure that the rainwater will be dispersed properly.

Then, unexpectedly in August, we discovered that the church furnace system heat exchanger in our one remaining boiler system essentially blew up... leaving our church with no heat source as fall and winter approached. So, last week, we ended up replacing the two old broken inefficient boilers with a new high efficiency unit. The new unit is efficient enough to allow us to apply for an energy rebate from Cascade Natural Gas in the amount of \$1600.00, which will be used towards the repayment of the small loan we took to obtain the system. We also have the need to replace the old leaking hot water tank in the furnace room, and that will be completed later this month.

Thank you members of Emmanuel, for your responsible votes to maintain God's house of worship and the child care center, by approving the expenditure of funds to replace the furnace and water heater units. If you would like to contribute further funds that will be used specifically for the furnace and water heater repayment, it would be greatly appreciated.

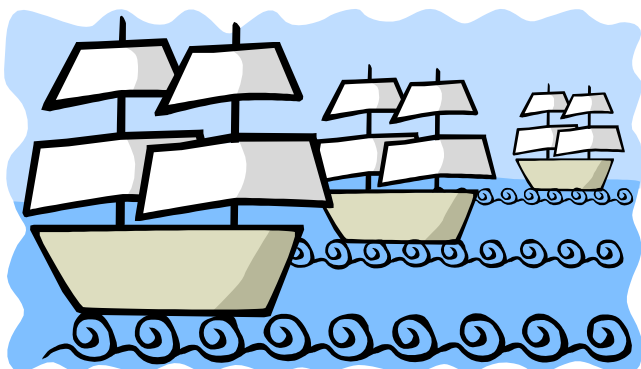
